Per capita apportionment for 2023 is \$48 per member.

A REFRESHER ON WHERE YOUR MONEY GOES by by Sue Butchinski

I wanted to take time to refresh everyone on what happens to your hard-earned money when you drop it in the collection plate each week. We have three categories on our envelopes, Current expenses, Benevolence and Building Fund. Current expenses, like it says, goes to pay for the budgeted expenses used to keep the church going, like payroll, insurance, property upkeep, utilities, office expense, etc. Benevolence is a pledged amount that goes to unified mission support split between Lehigh Presbytery, General Assembly and Synod. Session determines the amount pledged, and we have been at \$1000.00 per year for some time. I pay a prorated amount of \$83.33 monthly to the Presbytery, along with the prorated amount of our Per Capita for the year. The per capita is currently \$48 times the number of active members on our books at the end of

the previous year, therefore, I pay \$492.00 each month along with the Benevolence amount. The third category, Building Fund, is as it says, to be used for new builds, or building repairs beyond the realm of regular maintenance, which is a budgeted item. For example, the Brickote repair and painting came out of this fund. If someone donates to this fund, I can only use the funds for that purpose, and not for budgeted expenses, etc. That follows for all the other accounts that are separate from the budgeted accounts The Christian Ed fund, Memorial Fund, Special Collections (OGHS, Peace, Pentecost), Mission, Foodbank, Fellowship, Deacons, are all independent accounts which are limited to use for only their purpose. Memorial funds must be used for a special purpose, determined by Session, which can be identified as a memorial to the person or people for whom the money was donated, such as the front doors installed through Memorial funds. So for the three categories shown on the envelopes, the current balances are as follows: Current expenses is listed under the financial report in this newsletter each month; Benevolence is currently at \$3347.79, so we have over three years of coverage for this account; Building fund is currently at \$6648.60. Our Fight Against Food Insecurity

Our church has been active in the fight against food insecurity in our area since 2016 so I wanted to update you on where and how we've been involved. We were collecting food for the Whitehall Food Pantry that operates out of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church for some time before they requested a monthly donation of \$100 in lieu of the food so they could purchase what they needed. That donation continues every month. We currently have a balance of \$759.34 in the account which will fulfill our commitment through December of this year. We also collect items for holiday meals as needed. As such we are alternately the gravy church, stuffing church, pie crust church, etc. Also in 2016, we got involved with the Whitehall Coplay Hunger Initiative through the Community Meals and the Summer Breakfast Program. As WCHI expanded to opening a food pantry, we began collecting food and making monetary donations to them as we were able. Donations were made from the church as well as the Deacons, in the amount of \$3400.00. We continue to list their requested food items in the bulletin and newsletter for items to be dropped off in the shopping

cart by the stairlift.

The Whitehall Pantry (est. 1974) obtains about 50% of supplies from Second Harvest and the remaining 50% from churches like ours, individual donations and support from local businesses. They serve about 125 families per month and are open, by appointment only, on Mondays from 6:00 - 8:00 PM. They can be reached at 484-246-5715. Whitehall Coplay Hunger Initiative, operating out of St. John the Baptist Church in Stiles, obtains the majority of their supplies from Second Harvest, along with purchases made from grants obtained from Lehigh County and donations of food and money from churches like ours and other local organizations and businesses. They also provide fresh vegetables in the summer from their garden at Mickley-Prydun Farm. They are supplying food and toiletries to just under 1000 people per month, and are open, by appointment only, on the 2 nd and 3 rd Thursdays of each month, from 9:30 am to 1 pm and from 4:30 pm to 7 pm. They can be reached at 484-225-0358. In addition to the donations, we have active volunteers at both locations. We want to thank everyone who donates of their time, talents, and treasure to the fight against food insecurity in our community.
